of Judges For Senior Status

This is to notify members of the bar and the general public that the Commission is reviewing the qualifications of Senior Judge James A. Belson of the District of Columbia Court of Appeals and Judge Nan R. Shuker of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia, who is retiring. Judge Belson has requested a recommendation for reappointment as a Senior Judge, and Judge Shuker has requested a recommendation for an initial appointment as a Senior Judge.

The District of Columbia Retired Judge Service Act P.L. 98-598, 98 Stat. 3142, as amended by the District of Columbia Judicial Efficiency and Improvement Act, P.L. 99-573, 100 Stat. 3233, §13(1) provides in part as follows:

"...A retired judge willing to perform judicial duties may request a recommendation as a senior judge from the Commission. Such judge shall submit to the Commission such information as the Commission considers necessary to a recommendation under this subsection.

(2) The Commission shall submit a written report of its recommendation and findings to the appropriate chief judge of the judge requesting appointment within 180 days of the date of the request for recommendation. The Commission, under such criteria as it considers appropriate, shall make a favorable or unfavorable recommendation to the appropriate chief judge regarding an appointment as senior judge. The recommendation of the Commission shall be final.

(3) The appropriate chief judge shall notify the Commission and the judge requesting appointment of such chief judge's decision regarding appointment within 30 days after receipt of the Commission's recommendation and findings. The decision of such chief judge regarding such appointment shall be final."

The Commission hereby requests members of the bar, litigants, former jurors, interested organizations and members of the public to submit any information bearing on the qualifications of Judges Belson and Shuker which it is believed will aid the Commission. The cooperation of the community at an early stage will greatly aid the Commission in fulfilling its responsibilities. The identity of any person submitting materials will be kept confidential unless expressly authorized by the person submitting the information.

**NOTICE OF DEPLOYMENT OF CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION CAMERAS
APRIL 11 - 13, 2003 DURING THE INTERNATIONAL MONETARY FUND AND
WORLD BANK GROUP MEETINGS**

The Chief of the Metropolitan Police Department, pursuant to the public notice requirements established in 24 D.C. Municipal Regulations (DCMR) § 2502.1 *et seq.*, hereby gives notice that Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) cameras were deployed to support public safety operations during the International Monetary Fund and World Bank Group meetings and related anti-globalization and anti-war demonstrations from April 11 through April 13, 2003.

The temporary cameras were deployed generally along the permitted march routes for Saturday's anti-war demonstration organized by International A.N.S.W.E.R., and Sunday's anti-globalization demonstration organized by the Latin America Solidarity Coalition. The deployment lasted from the evening of Friday, April 11, through Sunday, April 13, 2003. Specifically, cameras were deployed in the vicinity of the following areas:

- 16th and Euclid Streets, NW (Malcolm X Park)
- 14th and U Streets, NW
- 13th Street and New York Avenue, NW
- Vermont Avenue and H Street, NW (Lafayette Park)
- 18th and I Streets, NW
- 19th and H Streets, NW

In addition, the MPD relocated two of the temporary CCTV cameras it deployed after March 17, 2003, from locations generally focusing on Potomac River bridges to the following areas. These cameras will remain activated until further notice:

- Farragut Square, NW
- McPherson Square, NW

These temporary cameras are in addition to the 14 cameras that are part of the MPD's current CCTV system. These 14 cameras have been activated since March 17, 2003, when the national threat level was raised from Elevated (Yellow) to High (Orange).

Pursuant to 24 DCMR §2502.1, the Metropolitan Police Department is required to provide public notice of plans to deploy CCTV cameras prior to such deployment, except under exigent circumstances. In this case, the timing of the application for and approval of the parade permit prevented the Department from providing public notice in the *D.C. Register* in advance of the deployment. § 2502.5 requires the Chief of Police to provide post-deployment public notification of any camera deployed pursuant to exigent circumstances. The public may submit comments in writing regarding a particular deployment, or the CCTV system in general, to the Chief of Police, Metropolitan Police Department, 300 Indiana Avenue, NW, Room 5080, Washington, DC, 20001, or via e-mail at chief@mpdc.org.

The Metropolitan Police Department's CCTV system is a secure, wireless network of 14 cameras owned and operated by the MPD. These cameras are mounted on various buildings primarily in the downtown DC area. They focus on public spaces around the National Mall, the US Capitol, the White House, Union Station and other critical installations, as well as major arteries and highways that pass through downtown DC. Under DC regulations, additional cameras can be added to the network on a temporary or permanent basis following a period of public comment. As noted above, during exigent circumstances, additional cameras can be deployed on a temporary basis without advance public notice, but with a post-deployment notification to the public.

The CCTV system is not a round-the-clock video monitoring operation. The system is activated only during major events in the District (such as large-scale demonstrations, the Fourth of July celebration, Presidential Inaugurations, etc.) or during periods of heightened alert for terrorism. CCTV camera feeds are displayed in the MPD's Joint Operations Command Center (JOCC), a secure facility located on the 5th Floor of police headquarters. The JOCC is operated by the MPD, but may include staff from other federal, regional, state and local public safety agencies participating in joint operations.

The MPD's use of CCTV is designed to ensure the protection of personal privacy rights. The CCTV network has no audio capability; it provides video images of public spaces only. The cameras can pan at 360 degrees and tilt at 180 degrees. The cameras do have the capability to zoom in on a particular location, but are used primarily to monitor wide areas of public space, not the individuals within that space. The CCTV system does not use face-recognition or any other biometric technology. Both DC regulations and internal MPD policy expressly prohibit the arbitrary monitoring of individuals or monitoring of individuals based on race, gender or other factors. Regulations and policies also prohibit the use of the CCTV system for the purpose of infringing on First Amendment rights.

Mini-Subgrants to Small Non-Profit Community-Based Organizations

The Department of Human Services (DHS), Income Service Maintenance Administration (IMA) is the lead agency in the District of Columbia for implementation of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program. To facilitate achievement of TANF purposes the DHS/IMA intends to award grant funds to small community-based and faith-based organizations that directly assist TANF customers and other low-income families and children in the District of Columbia.

DHS intends to make multiple grant awards of up to \$20,000 each to fund one or more services or activities offered by the eligible organizations for a 90-day period. Eligible organizations include small community-based, faith-based, non-profit organizations located in the District of Columbia with an annual budget not more than \$150,000. The service and activity to be funded through the mini-grant should have an immediate and direct impact on the TANF customer or other low-income families with children with household incomes of less than or equal to 200 percent of the federal poverty line.

Faith-based organizations, such as churches, synagogues, mosques, or religiously based social service affiliates of such organizations are encouraged to apply.

The Request for Application (RFA) will be released on May 7, 2003 and the deadline for submission is June 6, 2003 at 5:00 p.m. Applications may be obtained from 441 4th Street, NW, 400 South, Washington, DC 20001.
