RIGGS PARK/CHILLUM SITE**

Selected Remedy Dated February 20, 2009

BACKGROUND: On February 5, 2009, the District Department of the Environment (DDOE) and the Department of Health (DOH) announced the District of Columbia's selected remedy for the Riggs Park community, which addresses both the non-carcinogenic (or non-cancer) and carcinogenic (or cancer) risks posed by the release of hazardous materials, including the release of gasoline from underground storage tanks located at the gas station formerly owned by Chevron U.S.A., Inc. ("Chevron"), and located at 5801 Riggs Road in Chillum, Prince George's County, MD, under the District of Columbia Hazardous Waste Management Act of 1997 (D.C. Code §§ 8-1301, 8-1305(a)(9)), the Underground Storage Tank Management Act of 1990 (D.C. Code §§ 8-113, 8-113.08(d)), and under the Brownfield Revitalization Amendment Act of 2000 (D.C. Code §§ 8-632.01(b), 8-634.02(a)(b)), at a public meeting held at the Bacchus Lasalle Elementary School in Washington, D.C. On February 20, 2009, the District published the decision document, as well as an index to the administrative record in support of the decision.

PURPOSE OF THIS NOTICE: This Public Notice is to inform the public that the District will be providing a 30-day public comment period on its selected remedy. Instructions for participating in the 30-day public comment period are below.

Summary: Serve DC – The Mayor’s Office on Volunteerism announces the availability of DC Citizen Corps Emergency Preparedness funds for **grants up to \$75,000.**

DC Citizen Corps (DCCC) is a component of USA Freedom Corps, a White House initiative designed to foster a culture of citizenship, service, and responsibility and to help all Americans answer the President's Call to Service. Serve DC – The Mayor’s Office on Volunteerism is the designated coordinator of the DC Citizen Corps for the District of Columbia. DC Citizen Corps creates opportunities for individuals to help their communities prepare for and respond to emergencies. It brings together local leaders, citizen volunteers and the network of first responder organizations, such as fire departments, police departments and emergency medical personnel. The mission of the DC Citizen Corps is to have all citizens participate in making their communities safer, stronger and better prepared to prevent and handle threats of terrorism, crime, and disasters of all kinds.

Awards will be made to organizations in the District of Columbia to incorporate emergency preparedness activities, exercises, and trainings for potential volunteers in various DC communities. This initiative will support a wide range of program activities that emphasize readiness in the event of natural and man-made disasters in the District of Columbia. Additionally, applicants must propose to coordinate with and aid Serve DC in Emergency Support Function #16 - *Volunteer and Donation Management*, outlined in the District Response Plan. Prior knowledge and/or experience with Emergency Support Function #16 is preferred but not required. However, a willingness to be trained in details surrounding the Support Function is mandatory.

Criteria for eligible applicants: Eligible applicants are organizations currently operating emergency preparedness programs within the District of Columbia.

An organization described in Section 501 (c) (4) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 501 (c) (4), that engages in lobbying activities is not eligible to apply or act in any type of supervisory role in the program. **Individuals are not eligible to apply.**

All eligible applicants must meet all of the applicable requirements contained in the application guidelines and instructions. The Request for Application (RFA) will be released on March 27, 2009 at 9:00 a.m. **The deadline for submission is May 11, 2009 at 5:00 pm.**

The District of Columbia's Historic Preservation Office (HPO) announces the availability of grant funds from the General Fund of the District of Columbia, the Historic Landmark-District Protection Fund ("HLP Fund") for the restoration/preservation of historic residences in select historic districts.

A two-part application is available from the HPO. In FY2009, a total of \$1,250,000 is authorized. The maximum grant allowable is \$25,000 per household (\$35,000 in Anacostia Historic District). Part I applications may be submitted for any of three deadlines: **4:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 1, 2009; 4:00 p.m. Monday, August 3, 2009; or 4:00 p.m. Tuesday, December 1, 2009.** Part II application deadlines will be assigned upon receipt by HPO of completed Part I applications.

Eligible applicants for the Historic Homeowner Grant Program ("Grant") are private individuals who own and occupy a primary residence in one of the following historic districts: Anacostia, Blagden Alley/Naylor Court, Capitol Hill, Greater Fourteenth Street, Greater U Street, LeDroit Park, Mount Pleasant, Mount Vernon Square, Mount Vernon Triangle, Shaw, Strivers' Section, and Takoma Park. Eligible applicants must meet specific income tests to qualify household as a low- to moderate-income household; and must currently receive the Homestead Deduction property tax benefit. Based on household income, grantees may be required to provide a cash match to the grant equal to as much as 50% of the rehabilitation expenses.

Eligible rehabilitation work shall be restricted to exterior alterations/restoration, or interior major (non-cosmetic) structural repair.
